STATISTICS AND INFORMATION



The Town Council is administered as a first tier local government authority in an area whose County Authority responsibilities are maintained by Surrey County Council and whose District Council responsibilities are maintained by Reigate & Banstead Borough Council.

There are over **23,000** people residing within the boundary of this Town Council of which **18,113** are registered electors as at 1 April 2017.

The Precept is collected on the Town Council's behalf by Reigate & Banstead Borough Council. For the fiscal year 2017/18, it is set at £332,863. This equates to a sum of £35.94 per band D household. Please refer to the Finance Chairman's report for more details about the precept.

FINANCE & GENERAL PURPOSES COMMITTEE REPORT



I have been very proud to serve as the Finance & General Purposes Committee Chairman for a second year. My thanks to all the Committee members for their support and hard work.

I also would like to thank the Council staff, particularly Alan Jones (Town Clerk) and Rose Cavanagh (Responsible Financial Officer).

Financial Year 2017/18

The Town Council Precept for 2017/2018 has been set at a total net figure of £332,863. This means that the Town element of Council Tax will be an annual amount of £35.94 (just over 69p per week), representing an annual increase of **70p** per Band D household (+ 1.98%). The Town Council is fully committed to maintain all its services, as well as pursuing a programme of enhancements and new projects. These will include improvements to our recreation grounds and playgrounds.

The Town Council continues to review security in its recreation grounds. Provision has been made for continued enhancements to CCTV, in consultation with Surrey Police. There will also continue to be a commitment for regular security patrols in all our parks to aid the safety of all members of public.

The Council has also made provision for floral displays to enhance the town centre for the benefit of residents and visitors, in support of our planned entries for South and South East in Bloom 2017, having already won two Silver Gilt awards in 2015 and 2016.

Our ageing skate park has been replaced during 2016/17. We were delighted to receive an award from Surrey County Council's Community Improvements Fund, with the balance funded from our earmarked Reserve funds.





Website, Town Guide and newsletter

The Town Council's website continues to provide vital information for residents, with an improved mobile site launched this year. The 2017 edition of the Town Guide was published in January and was delivered to all residents via Royal Mail, however copies are still available from the Town Council offices, with a digital copy also available on our website. The Town Guide is funded through the advertising contained therein and provides such key information to residents at no cost to this Council. The Town Council staff also prepare a monthly e-newsletter with both Council and local news and events, which goes to over 1400 residents and is increasing in popularity every month.

Future services

With the removal of government grants to County and Borough Councils causing gaping holes in annual Council budgets, there is a risk that the higher levels of local government may be forced to withdraw some services in order to balance their books in the years ahead. If this proves to be the case, Horley Town Council will discuss with residents as to which services they would deem essential. These could potentially be devolved to and managed by the Town Council, with any costs met through Council Tax (Precept).

In a challenging financial climate, Horley Town Council is committed to providing and enhancing facilities that meet the communities' needs, and in doing so, achieving them at best value.

PLANNING & DEVELOPMENT COMMITTEE REPORT



2016/17

I have taken over the Chairmanship of this Committee this year after stepping down as Chairman of the Council. This is the busiest of the three Council Committees and because of timing constraints meets twice as often as any of the other committees. It is a challenge which I am happy to take on and, hopefully, there will be benefits from my previous experience on both the Town and Borough Councils.

The Town Council is a legal consultee on all planning applications within the parish boundary and the Planning & Development Committee acts for the Council on these matters.

The Committee also considers any planning matters from neighbouring authorities such as Crawley Borough, Mole Valley District and Tandridge District Councils, which may have an impact on the town and its residents. During the past 12 months, the Committee has considered a total of 296 [261] Planning Applications for Horley. These comprise:

- 4 [9] Consultations from Surrey County Council (SCC) on schools and others from neighbouring authorities such as Crawley (including Gatwick Airport) and Mole Valley;
- 9 [27] large developments of 6 or more dwellings;
- 22 [28] small developments of less than 6 dwellings;
- 124 [175] extensions, loft conversions, conservatories and fencing;
- 38 [36] covering tree preservation orders;
- 38 [21] commercial properties including changes of use for retail units.

The figures from last year are included in brackets for comparison purposes.

The Committee is also responsible for the following:

Gatwick Airport:

We are very fortunate in having Councillor Mike George as our representative on the Gatwick Airport Consultative Committee (GATCOM). He is also on the Noise and Track Monitoring Advisory Group (NATMAG). He reports on all matters relating to the airport. Details of The Route 4 controversy and Horley Overflights were explained to the Committee and reports have appeared on the Town Council website, as well as in our e newsletters, for the benefit of local residents. Members were also able to attend a tour of the Airport arranged by Gatwick Airport Ltd (GAL).

Off Airport Parking and UBER Taxis:

We have encouraged Gatwick Airport Limited to help local councils to resolve off airport parking problems. People continue to park their cars in Horley roads when going off on holiday rather than leaving them in designated car parks. This adds to congestion and causes problems with local residents.

Uber taxis have come to an arrangement with Reigate and Banstead to park their vehicles in the High Street Car Park away from local residents. It was hoped that this would help to control antisocial behaviour in other car parks close to residential properties. The initial teething problems appear to be coming under control, as a result of ongoing pressure on Reigate & Banstead Borough Council from both Horley Borough and Horley Town Council Members. We will continue to monitor and push for a permanent more acceptable solution.

Highways:

As a Council we have always had worries about the state of our roads. As a result, the Executive Member of Surrey County Council (SCC), Cllr Fury, was invited to speak to the Town Council. He explained that SCC is having increasing financial problems as a result of reduced grant allocation from Central Government. He promised to do what he could and reminded members of the function of the Local Committee (SCC and R&BBC) in prioritising Highways Issues.

Local Transport:

There are still problems with the bus routes in The Acres and the problem is being repeated in the North West Sector (Westvale Park). We will continue to exert pressure on the appropriate Authorities to resolve these issues.

Horley Regeneration:

We have good representation on the Horley Regeneration Forum. The Acres (North East Sector) is effectively complete and the Westvale Park development (North West Sector) is well under way. We were disappointed not to have been Consulted on Street naming. We continue to press for resolution of parking issues and bus issues on the estate. Tanyard Barn Community Centre has been completed on the Acres development.

We have contributed to the Borough Council's consultation on their Development Management Policy. We have made a few suggestions but we support the general thrust of the plan.

Proposed Business Park:

There has been very little information on this issue and it is difficult to know what will happen, if anything, on this site. We will continue to monitor it.

Horley Town Management Group:

We continue to contribute to and support this Group.

Flooding:

As a potential area for flooding, we continue to monitor developments on this subject. We intend to review our resilience policies and information.

Planning Committee:

The Committee meets monthly and members of the public are encouraged to attend and address the Committee on planning or other matters. Our determinations on planning applications are available to view on our website together with our responses to consultations.

We continue to offer training and updates to members of the Committee both internally, as well as externally through the Surrey Association of Local Councils (Surrey ALC). We also encourage presentations by Officers from both Borough and County Councils. The Community Infrastructure Levy (CIL) is a new challenge which will, in suitable residential developments, result in 15% of the Levy being transferred to the Town Council for Local Projects for the benefit of local residents. Unfortunately, most new developments in the Town are not liable for CIL as the major developments currently in Horley pre-date CIL. We look forward to this new income stream having benefits for Horley Residents in the future.

In conclusion, I would like to thank my Vice Chairman, Cllr Richard Biggs and all members of the Committee for their hard work and support throughout the last year. My thanks, also to Joan Walsh, our Planning Officer, without whose support our job would be impossible. This year has put additional strain on staff and members because of changes in information released by the Borough regarding planning applications and determinations, so my thanks are particularly valid.

TOWN AWARDS

The Town Awards scheme has been in operation since 2000, with the first awards being presented at the Annual Town Meeting of 10 April 2000. Nominations for Town Awards are invited every year, when any resident can complete a nomination form, together with a seconder, to propose an individual for outstanding service or commitment to the town. Horley Town Council is responsible for the administration and final selection of award winners according to strict guidelines and criteria.

The Awards Sub Committee reviews the nominations and makes its recommendations to the Town Council. Award winners receive a Town Badge, a Certificate of Commendation and their Citation. Presentations are usually made at the Town Meeting or at other appropriate events such as the Horley in Bloom Awards Ceremony, subject to the award winners' approval.

This year an Award was presented to **Michael Nichols** for his unpaid work in both the Old and New Churchyards. The Award was presented at St Bartholomew's Church on 19 February 2017.

HENRY WEBBER MEMORIAL SERVICE

A Memorial Service was held in the Memorial Gardens, Horley Recreation Ground on Thursday 21 July 2016 to commemorate the centenary of the death of Henry Webber, who died in active service on 21 July 1916 on the battlefields of France during World War One, aged 67 years, the oldest soldier to be killed on active service.

The service was conducted by Rev John Glasspool, Chaplain of the Royal British Legion, Horley Branch. The Memorial Service included the unveiling of a lectern, detailing Henry's life story.

The service was well attended and included three generations of Henry Webber's family, some of whom had only met each other for the first time the previous week. Henry's grandchildren and their families travelled from as far as Australia to attend the service. The Horley community was well represented including, pupils from Horley Infant School, Meath Green Junior School, members of the Horley Churches inc St Barts, Surrey County Council, Royal British Legion and Town Councillors. David Hall, a local historian, presented a family tree to Henry Webber's great great great grandson, Jamie Alpine.

At the Service, the Royal British Legion Horley Branch provided a standard bearer supported by two buglers from the Redhill Corps of Drums. During the service poems were read, including one written and read by Meath Green Junior School.

Town Mayor Cllr Mike George said "The Council has long been aware of the significant anniversary of the centenary of the death of Henry Webber. He was the very first Parish Council Chairman as well as a guiding force in many other local organisations and largely responsible for the development of Horley in its formative years at the end of the 19th century. It is a very great honour to commemorate his life with the lectern and we hope that many younger people will come to read it. The Town Council is very pleased to have been able to welcome so many of the Webber family to Horley."




