## Introduction

This Annual Report has been prepared by Horley Town Council. We hope that it provides an informative overview into our business performance and activities.

Included within this publication are reports from the Chairman & Town Mayor, together with the statutory reports made by the Town Council's Committee Chairmen. The report further provides detailed information and statistics. At the time of producing this Annual Report, our accounts for 2021/22 are not available, however, we have included information relating to the financial year 2020/21. The unaudited accounts for 2021/22 will be made available to the public for inspection in July 2022. We expect to publish the audited Annual Return on our website in October 2022.

The ongoing complications of the Covid-19 pandemic brought many challenges for the Town Council to overcome in the past year. However, we are delighted to have been able to maintain a steadfast approach by keeping the Council Offices open to the public as far as possible in line with Government restrictions. We did this by adapting to hybrid meeting arrangements until we could return to in-person meetings whilst providing ongoing guidance on the safe use of our community buildings, parks and open spaces which has since moved from mandatory to advisory. Along with my fellow officers and all the staff, we were able to provide everything necessary to maintain business continuity so that all our council meetings along with our statutory business and provision of services could remain in place. At times like these, it is clearly notable the sheer tenacity of individuals to overcome many unforeseen challenges and I would like to personally thank all our Members for their immense help and support during the most difficult times as well as supporting the HTC Staff Team.

In the aftermath of the pandemic, we were still able to reach final completion of the 'Café In The Park' project at Horley Recreation Ground in November 2021 which is the largest capital project ever undertaken by this Council. We now look forward to undertaking new, exciting community projects as part of our strategic Town Plan objectives and overall vision, some of which have recently completed or are underway. We will also continue to seek grants through various funding opportunities and will secure earmarked funds for our grounds and playground upgrades along with other new potential projects. Our recent Community Infrastructure Levy (CIL) survey with Horley residents was very well received with many respondents putting forward very useful ideas on smaller community projects for consideration to support development in the local area.

The Horley Town Council website is frequently updated with news items and other important communications as well as Council Agenda and Minutes plus a variety of community and business information. We continually make website enhancements to keep it informative and contemporary whilst ensuring that it meets our legal obligations by remaining fully accessible by everyone under the website accessibility regulations for public sector bodies.

We have produced a list of all Town Councillors and their representation on various Committees and Outside Bodies which are shown later on in this report. # Statistics and Information


The Town Council is administered as a first-tier Local Government Authority in an area whose County Authority responsibilities are maintained by Surrey County Council and whose Borough Council responsibilities are maintained by Reigate & Banstead Borough Council.

At the last census (2011) there were 23,000 people living within the boundary of this Town Council of which 19,548 are registered electors as of April 2022. However, several new housing developments have now become occupied since the census, so this figure is expected to rise. (The statistics from the 2021 census by the Office for National Statistics were not available at the time of producing this Annual Report.)

The Precept is collected on the Town Council's behalf by Reigate & Banstead Borough Council. For the fiscal year 2022/23, it is set at £464,794. This means that the Town element of Council Tax will be an average annual amount of £43.17 per household, representing an annual increase of £1.66 per Band D property (+ 4%). This figure is below last year's Surrey average of £47.81 for Town and Parish Councils and well below the National Average figure which last year was £71.86.

# Chairman's Report 2021-22

This year has been my first as chairman of Horley Town Council, the first woman in over 30 years to hold the role, and only the third female chairman in the 127 years of the council. It has been a huge honour for me to hold the role and I thank my fellow councillors for their faith in electing me and for their support through -out the year.

With the COVID-19 pandemic still looming large over the world, some of the challenges alluded to by my predecessor at this time last year continued, with English restrictions not truly eased until July. However, despite the many challenges, the continued community spirit in Horley was amazing to witness. Thank you to all our key workers in Horley and to everyone that helped friends or neighbours, contributed to food banks and more.

My first formal mayoral engagement was to attend the unveiling of a new defibrillator at The Bull public house, which was generously donated by the charity Rapid Relief Team. We were also grateful to Chris Hancock, landlord of The Bull for allowing us to site it at the pub. Sadly Chris, who was much involved in the community through his role as Vice-Chairman of the Horley Town Management Group, subsequently passed away in the autumn, but this is a valuable legacy.

I have represented Horley at various events in Surrey over the past year, including the High Sheriff's Service for the Judiciary, the Surrey Civic Network, the Lord-Lieutenant's Awards evening for cadets and, most recently, a service to mark 70 years since Queen Elizabeth II's accession to the throne on 6 February. Locally, I was pleased to attend the official opening of the Café at Horley Recreation Ground, to commemorate the 100th birthday of the Horley Branch of the Royal British Legion and to formally open the 'Halt & Pull' pub, still affectionately known to many residents as The Chequers.

This year, Horley Local History Society has also successfully applied for a grant from Horley Town Council towards the cost of Horley's first ever blue plaque, unveiled earlier this month outside Very Bettie, 1 Yattendon Road, on the site of the then Horley Post Office and in tribute to Ada Coates' receipt

of the telegram in May 1900 announcing that 'Mafeking had been relieved' after a seven-month siege in the Second Boer War. The History Society hope to be able to add other blue plaques around the town and we look forward to seeing this.

There is much to look forward to in the months ahead, with Queen Elizabeth II's Platinum Jubilee celebrations and Horley Carnival both taking place in June this year. We also eagerly await the handover from the developers of the Westvale Park allotments.

In conclusion, I wish to pay tribute to our staff team, ably led by our Town Clerk Joan Walsh. Horley Town Council would not function without our brilliant team, who put in so much effort, so my huge thanks to Joan, and to Responsible Financial Officer Judy Morgan, Communications & Compliance Officer Helen Maan, Planning & Finance Officer Rachel Botcherby and Administrative Assistant Alice Cole. Carol Fenton retired this year, after 25 years with the Council, most recently as Head of Leisure and Deputy Clerk. We thank Carol for her many years' service to the council and wish her a most enjoyable retirement. Our caretakers and contractors have also been working hard in the last year to keep our parks, open spaces and community buildings open but safe for all and I also thank all of them for their hard work.

My thanks also to my vice-chairman David Powell, whose advice has been invaluable as I took over from him as council chairman this year, and to all fellow councillors for the hard work they each put in for the benefit of Horley residents. I would also like to acknowledge our new county councillors Jordan Beech and Andy Lynch, who have maintained the regular meetings between county and town councils to keep that valuable close link and support for issues affecting Horley. I would also like to thank the Leader of Reigate & Banstead Borough Council, Cllr Mark Brunt, as well as Borough Officers and our Horley Borough Councillors, for all their support and advice.

# Finance & General Purposes Committee Report 2021-22

The last year has continued to be a challenging one for us because of the pandemic, but serving Horley as the Chairman of the Finance & General Purposes Committee has been a pleasure, as ever. I'm so glad that we've been able to hold our Council meetings in person again, and I would like to offer my sincere thanks to the Council officers, to my new Vice-Chairman ClIr Jante Baird, and to all the Committee members for all their hard work over the last twelve months.

#### Financial Year 2021-22

At our Full Council meeting on 14<sup>th</sup> December 2021. the Town Council Precept for 2022-23 was set at a total net figure of £464,794. This means that the Town element of Council Tax will be an annual amount of £43.17 (approximately 83p per week), representing an annual increase of £1.66 per Band D household (+ 4%). This increase is less than last year as we felt it was important to recognise the financial hardships residents may have suffered due to the pandemic, but we obviously want to remain fully committed to maintaining and/or developing all of Horley Town Council's services. This figure is lower than both the Surrey and National averages for Town and Parish councils (£47.81 and £71.86 respectively). Our aim over the next financial year is build back up both our earmarked funds and our general reserve (to safeguard future maintenance of and investment in Council assets and services) after a difficult couple of years.

I am delighted that the Café at the Horley Recreation Ground continues to thrive. It was the largest capital project ever undertaken by Horley Town Council, and it's lovely to hear all the positivity surrounding it, as well as visiting there myself. The official opening in September was well attended, with even our local MP, Claire Coutinho, in attendance. Our next project at the Recreation Ground is to widen the vehicle entrance to the car park, and move the pedestrian gate, in order to improve community safety.

The Town Council often reviews security in all of its recreation grounds and there continues to be a commitment for regular security patrols in all of our parks to aid the safety of all members of the public. We are also looking at improving the lighting in some of the parks to help keep residents safe in the evenings and at night.

The Council has – as always - made provision for floral displays to brighten the town centre for the benefit of both residents and visitors.

#### Website, Town Guide and eNewsletter

The Town Council's website continues to be the first port of call for information on the Council and the services it provides. Statistics show that the numbers of people using the site on mobile devices is increasing further. Please let us know if there is anything you feel could be added to the website to make it even more useful.

The 2021 edition of the Town Guide was published both in print and digitally and delivered to all homes in Horley as normal in June. Copies are still available from the Town Council offices, with the digital copy available on our website. The Town Guide is funded through the advertising contained therein and provides key information to residents at no cost to this Council.

The Council staff continue to prepare and circulate a monthly e-newsletter with both Council and local news as well as events that may be of interest to residents. We are getting new subscribers every month, and we hope that residents find it informative and interesting. Please encourage your friends and family to sign up to receive it too!

The COVID-19 pandemic has continued to be rather challenging to say the least, and I'm sure you will join me in being grateful that we seem to be returning to our "new normal". Horley Town Council has weathered the storm superbly due to the commitment and support of our fantastic officers and staff, as well as the enthusiasm of our Councillors. Thank you so much to all of you for the work you've continued to do throughout the past year.

We would like to acknowledge the support of County Councillor Andy Lynch, who has used his Member's Allowance to fund summer planters in Court Lodge and Horley Row.

We were very happy to be able to hold the Horley in Bloom competition again this year, a little later than usual, but we had a very high standard of entries nonetheless. Many thanks to everyone involved, both our entrants and our judges and staff that administer the competition. We also ran a photographic competition again this year, and would like to congratulate all entrants and winners on the very impressive photographs received.

During the year we have, despite all the challenges faced, managed to host the fun fair, circus and dog show in Horley Recreation Ground and Extreme Fun in Court Lodge. We were pleased to be able to provide these services for our residents, which were all a great success. I am pleased to say that the Tennis for Free scheme has continued in the tennis courts at Horley Recreation Ground; our thanks to Gareth and his time for making it possible to teach adults and children alike. Thank you also to County Councillor Jordan Beech, who has committed some of his Member's Allowance to fund this to continue in 2022/23.

Allotment sites in Horley (both in Church Road and Langshott) continue to go from strength to strength and we hope to be able to open the Westvale Park allotment site soon.

We are fortunate to have several groups of volunteers in Horley. Many of these have had to work on their own during the past year, without mixing with other households. Our thanks go to all volunteers, including Horley Conservation Group, Gatwick Greenspace Partnership and the Q Garden volunteers, for all their hard work improving the green spaces around Horley.

Finally, I would like to thank my Vice-Chairman, Cllr Fiona Stimpson, and other members of the Leisure & Amenities committee for all their support and hard work. I would also like to thank Carol Fenton, who was our Head of Leisure & Deputy Town Clerk until October, and wish her a most enjoyable retirement.

Many thanks to Joan Walsh, Town Clerk, and all the staff team for their hard work improving the leisure facilities of Horley and supporting this committee.

## Planning & Development Committee Report 2021-22

The Town Council is a legal consultee on most planning applications within the parish boundary and the Planning & Development Committee acts for the Council on these matters. We also have a sub committee to review plans that have deadline dates prior to a meeting. Its decisions are ratified at the next meeting by the full committee, or a supplementary comment is submitted to the borough council.

The Committee also considers any planning matters from neighbouring authorities such as Crawley, Mole Valley and Tandridge Borough and District Councils, which may have an impact on the town and its residents.

During the past 12 months the Committee has considered a total of 280 [254] Planning Applications for Horley. These comprise:

- 4 [8] Consultations from Surrey County Council (SCC) on schools and others from neighbouring authorities such as Crawley (including Gatwick Airport) and Mole Valley.
- 19 [15] large developments of 6 or more dwellings.
- 50 [23] small developments of less than 6 dwellings.
- 141[140] extensions, loft conversions, conservatories and fencing.
- 47 [54] covering tree preservation orders.
   19[14] commercial properties including changes of use for retail units.

The figures in [] are for the previous year for comparison. Since May 2020 the borough council is no longer required to consult with us on some categories of applications such as permitted development though we do monitor these.

The Committee is also responsible for the following:

#### **Gatwick Airport:**

Through our on-going membership of the Gatwick Airport Consultative Committee [GATCOM] together with our appointment as a GATCOM member of the Noise and Track Monitoring Advisory Group [NATMAG] we are actively engaged in all airport matters as they may affect the local communities.

Forecourt charges recently introduced continues to be a major issue for some of the town's residents who use the airport's railway station to commute to London and the council is working to support residents from some parts of Horley in their discussions with Gatwick.

DCO and the Northern Runway Project consultation was probably the most complex consultation that the town council has had to consider with evidence amounting to some 2,000 pages. Due to its complexity the town council set up a working group based around four topics to draft our response.

These being flooding, surface access, noise and air quality. A major difference this being a DCO is the council not being a legal consultee, so we spent much time working with borough officers making our views known; the borough being one of the six host authorities around the airport. The borough officers also helped with technical advice on matters such as air quality and noise impacts. I would like to place on record my thanks to those officers and Councillor Richard Biggs for their co-operation and support and establishing a very close working relationship which will stand us in very good stead for the next steps of the DCO process.

The council determined to object to the proposed change of use of the northern runway but to maintain its previous position of supporting a two terminal/single runway airport. This, based upon Gatwick's figures will still allow for a major expansion in passenger numbers.

Route 4 - proposals to re-design this route continues with a number of options being designed. The council is fully engaged in this process.

Airspace modernisation planning has resumed after the pause created by COVID with the council again fully engaged in briefings with the aim that the current regulation prohibiting departing flights from overflying the majority of Horley will be maintained.

The council has continued, along with neighbouring parish councils, to participate in regular virtual meetings with Gatwick Airport where issues affecting the local communities are discussed.

This is also an opportunity for the airport to brief us on business activities at the airport both current and future.

This committee made up of town councillors and residents, led by Town Councillor Fiona Stimpson has continued its work to receive and report on issues with the pavements across the town with particular emphasis where the condition of pavements is proving to be an obstacle to residents who need to use a wheelchair or mobility scooter. The committee has been involved in the Delivering Change programme. Working with County Councillor Jordan Beech some progress has been made during this year, but much remains to be done.

#### Wheatfield Way/VAS:

Working with the County Councillor Jordan Beech and local residents I am happy to report that, after many months of discussions to address the issues on this road from speeding, an increase in amount of and changes in the mix of traffic, the Town Council has agreed to pay for the installation of Vehicle Activated Signs with a survey to be carried out to determine the best locations for these signs.

#### Lee Street:

The area between its junction with Court Lodge Road and the River Mole bridge is becoming an area of concern following three incidents over many months of vehicles leaving the road causing damage to resident's properties, street furniture and hitting the bridge. Surrey Police has confirmed there are issues with speeding motorists but in general this stretch of road is deemed to be a low priority. A meeting has taken place with our two county councillors and a Highways officer with an agreement that a survey will be carried to identify what mitigation measures are available to manage traffic speeds in what is becoming a very busy road with a noticeable increase in HGV's and buses.

#### A23 Traffic Study:

For many months we, together with Salfords & Sidlow Parish Council, have been concerned on the impacts of traffic levels along the A23/Bonehurst Road, taking into consideration existing traffic and

the impacts from new residential and commercial developments both current and proposed. To us Highways were tasking each development in isolation and ignoring the cumulative impact. Therefore we requested a traffic study be undertaken by Highways from the Chequers roundabout to the Three Arch road junction.

Results of the study have just been released with the data for the Chequers roundabout to follow. It appears that the study area was extended to include the junctions with Vicarage Lane/Victoria Road and Massetts Road.

#### **Horley Regeneration:**

Projects under the Delivering Change programme continue to be developed and the council has, from monthly briefings with borough officers on their progress, the ability to input our suggestions where we think we can address current issues and future improvements.

The council has also been fully involved in stakeholder meetings under the Surrey County Council led Thinking Places consultation

#### **Horley Town Management Group:**

The group's work this year has centred around the Delivering Change projects across the town centre and the consultation carried out by Thinking Places with several briefings with county and borough officers. These have been to gather the views of the group and to receive updates on the community responses once consultations have closed. At the time of writing this report public consultation on parts of the Delivering Change has just begun.

It is undoubted that Covid-19 has had an effect of demands on our services.

We have needed continue dealing with applications in the way reported last year i.e., less paper and more emails and telephone calls. We have also continued to make purchases on behalf of applicants and having them delivered direct to them where appropriate.

Our current Balance, at the date of this report, is £10,728.25.

Our income from Smiths Charity remains at £14,040 but this is under review and it is not certain that the uplift of £7,000 awarded over the last three years will continue.

The expenditure to date since August 2021 to date is £5,515.05.

We have helped people from all of our target categories and during our last accounting year to 31<sup>st</sup> July last we dealt with 83 applications and affected the lives of 300 people.

We have been assisted in our efforts by referral from professional agencies and such organisations as C.A.B and we continue to develop our relationships with such groups.

We have developed an information pack which has been shared with all local schools and have continued to develop relationships with local statutory and volunteer services.

A recent addition to this has been a collaborative connection with Horley Lions Club which has a welfare fund serving many of the same objectives as ourselves.

We have received a donation of £100 via the Charities Aid Foundation from a, so far, anonymous source.

Our advertising has largely relied on use of social media and our own website and we are more than happy to have local residents 'share' our information.






